I had the privilege and good fortune to work with Chris during my years of involvement with the parish council. He was an extremely knowledgeable, diligent and effective Parish Clerk, who made a major contribution to the wellbeing of the parish and its residents. You could be sure that if any issues or problems were raised, Chris would be on to them in very short order. He developed a very good rapport with local government departments and as a result was able to get results, where many larger parish and town councils failed.

Occasionally, Chris could appear to be somewhat sharp or abrupt in his manner, but he was actually a very kind and caring individual. At parish council meetings there were times when he would express himself very forcefully on matters that he felt very strongly about, but he never turned them into personal issues. The temperature could raise, but quickly return to quiet normality. He wore his heart on his sleeve.

He had a great sense of humour, which at times bordered on the anarchic. On one occasion he was contacted by a woman who threatened to sue the council because her son was stung by nettles which were just outside the playground fence. Chris's response was to tell the woman to keep her son away from the fence and use a dock leaf!

Chris left some very big shoes to fill when he finally retired as Parish Clerk, and his involvement with many aspects of parish life is still sorely missed. I enjoyed his company on both formal and informal occasions and consider myself very fortunate to have known him.

CHRIS ARNOLD came to the Ellesborough Parish Hall Management Committee three years ago to bring his financial expertise and knowledge and to help get the accounts in good order which he certainly did. He was fastidious in the detail and was an enthusiastic and eager member of the small Committee which helps with the upkeep and maintenance of such a prominent focal point within the village.

All of the Committee members shall miss him as behind every stern word of authority, there was always an easy smile and a youthful sense of humour. It was good to have him at the helm like an irascible sea Captain as he galvanised us all into getting things done for the good of the Community. He had great enthusiasm to the end and all of the Parish Hall Committee, especially Maureen Audsley in her absence, pay their respects and wish him resting peace.

News & Reports

Kimble & Ellesborough W.l.

Kimble and Ellesborough WI meet at Stewart Hall, Station Road, Kimble, on the first Wednesday of the month at 2pm. We love to have visitors and everyone is made very welcome. We have a speaker each month and of course there is aways plenty of tea!

Joining the WI is a really good experience and a great way to make new friends, there are wonderful opportunities for everyone within the WI. Our Institute offers a £300 bursary every year so that one lucky member can go to our Denman College in Marcham, near Oxford to study something new, whatever she likes. But you have to be in it to win it! Come along and meet us we are known to be an especially friendly group - and it's free to visit.

At the <u>March</u> meeting of Kimble and Ellesborough WI there were beautiful tulips on the President's table reminding us that spring is just around the corner. The President, Liz Malvisi, greeted two new members then gave further details of the forthcoming Group Meeting where the speaker will be Jill Ayres who will talk about the Geology of Monks Risborough. 500 million Years in 45 minutes. Sounds interesting!

The President read a letter she had received from our National Chairman, Lynne Stubbings on behalf of the NFWI Board of Trustees following the recent negative press reports about the WI in the Daily Mail. All members were saddened to read the article based on many factual errors. She had written to the Daily Mail but so far had received no reply or news of any retraction. The WI continues to flourish in its 103rd year with over 222,000 members, 30,000 new member joined last year. Our own WI is well known for its friendly and fun atmosphere; think about joining us, as you see above there is always lots to look forward to and we'd make you very welcome.

After tea our speaker was Cally Foster. After a performance based background Cally pursued a career as a speech and drama specialist. She was the principal of her Bucks based drama studio for over 20 years and traveled the world as a examiner and adjudicator for LAMDA. Her talk was entitled 'A Funny Thing Happened on the Road to Retirement'. She spoke confidently with her highlighted sense of accents and entertained us with poems from A.A. Milne's When We Were Six - and also Christopher Matthew's, Now we are Sixty. She read some powerful Shakespeare and also some wonderful Pam Ayres.

At the April W.I. meeting we received updates on the Annual Council meeting at the Waterside Theatre in Aylesbury on 18th April, a visit with a guided tour of St. Paul's Cathedral is arranged for 19th April, the Group Meeting hosted by Monks Risborough W.I. is on 25th April, and we look forward to our visit to Chenies Manor to see the tulips on 9th May. An outing is also being arranged to Chavenage, a privately owned Elizabethan Manor House currently used as Trenwith for the filming of Poldark.

After a nice cup of tea with *very* nice hot cross buns - our speaker [Mr. Sirot-Smith] was introduced as Laurence Washington, Lord of the Manor of Sulgrave and Suchbury. He appeared in full Elizabethan costume, [complete with cod

piece] and told the story of his ancestors. We learned the remarkable history of the Washington family which included the first President of the United States of America, George Washington. Interestingly the Washington family's coat of arms showing stars and stripes, is said to have influenced the design of the American flag. It can be seen over the entrance to the Manor.

At the May meeting Maggie Kaye reported on the recent Icknield Group meeting which was very interesting as it concerned the geology of our local area. We also heard about Margaret Couling's visit to the Aylesbury Waterside Theatre as our delegate at the Annual Council Meeting of the Bucks. Federation of WI's. She told us about the wonderful speakers she and other WI members had enjoyed including The High Sheriff of Bucks, Professor Ruth Yarwell who was responsible for raising Wycombe College to University status, and Martin McElhatton who was representing Wheelpower, [British Wheelchair Sports]. He invited us to Stoke Mandeville to see the Paralympic sports facilities. Dr. Natalie Weldon from the University of Portsmouth spoke about all the plastic in the sea and what we could do to help this awful problem, we should all be keen to help the environment, she said.

After lunch, the final speaker of the day was Christine Walkden, who told us her amazing story. She started gardening at 9 years old, tending all her neighbours' front gardens, at 11 years old she had her first allotment and was selling vegetables to her neighbours and her school teachers. She hated school and played truant as often as possible, because by the time she left school she had 9 allotments. She spoke in a most entertaining way for over an hour - without notes.

The May meeting is always an important meeting for WI, it is our resolution meeting where we discuss our campaign for the coming year. It is 100 years since the first WI campaign on the provision of a sufficient supply of convenient and sanitary State aided housing. Over the 100 years since then the WI have passed over 400 resolutions and have achieved change on hundreds of issues that affect women and their communities across the world. This year our resolution is MENTAL HEALTH MATTERS as much as physical health. The WI urges everyone to recognise the importance of parity between mental health

and physical health and to take action to make it as acceptable to talk about mental health issues as much as physical health issues, and to lobby government for better support for mental illness. Mental illness can affect any sector of society and the WI are concerned that there is still a stigma around talking about this illness. The WI will work to reduce the stigma surrounding mental health by learning about the issues and discussing it openly in the community. Each year around one in four people will experience a mental health problem and almost all will face discrimination from friends, family and colleagues which can worsen the problem and delay or impede their getting help and treatment and eventual recovery. It is estimated that one in ten young people are affected by mental health conditions such as depression, self-harming and eating

disorders. A WI campaign could help to extend the reach of mental health awareness and encourage more people to seek help.

It's not all jam and Jerusalem at WI - or indeed tea and cake.

During the afternoon we had a Royal Wedding Quiz, it wasn't easy but was a lot of fun. There were chocolates for the winning team. At the end of the meeting it was decided to hold a coffee morning for Mr. McElhatton to raise money for Wheelpower, and to invite him to come along and talk to all our members about wheelchair sports. We even offered to have it in a member's home - in her absence!

Gardening in Ellesborough

Notes from an occasional diary

The long drawn out winter has given way to a spring of non-stop surprises. Cold spells as the 'Beast from the East' which blasted the garden at one end of a week gave way to a record breaking heat wave from the Azores at the end of the next week. And variations on that theme were repeated more than once. Fortunately, unlike last year, so far no late frosts. Right now, two weeks before the official end of spring, it is full on glorious summer. Goodness knows what is to follow. A blasting hot summer or an intermittent dripping wet version? About as uncertain as the Brexit negotiations.

Weeks in which plant growth seemed to be held back in suspense suddenly and gloriously explodes with all sorts of flowering and blossom coming all at once. One minute early flowering plants such as daffodils are struggling to put on a show than they are overtaken by later flowering varieties; then just a quickly they are all over. At times it has been a wonderful kaleidoscope of colours all evolving and merging, coming out and dying back on a daily basis. Backing it all are the stunning mixed early greens of trees and shrubs opening from buds to full leaf. Looking out from the conservatory it is almost like a speeded up video show. So the gardeners old 'you should have seen those tulips or whatever last week' is more like 'you should have seen them yesterday'. Back in February we were full of optimism and thought we were quite well on top of seasonal work but gradually as the wet, cold conditions dragged on so we fell further behind. The Head Gardener (HG) needs to be at least partially in control of events and the frustration of getting held up for prolonged periods is not a good thing for health and temperament . As the dates for the first group of visitors looms up, every opportunity, when it is not actually raining hard, is taken up with weeding, seeding, transplanting, pruning, compost spreading etc. Some early sowing of vegetables, peas and beans, failed. The general consensus seems to be that in late April we were at least two weeks later in weather conditions than in recent years, no doubt we are now catching up fast.

Fortunately all has gone quite well in the greenhouse, we do not seem to have had any major over-winter loses. It gets decidedly crowded with trays of annuals being brought on for the Kimble and Ellesborough Horticultural Society annual plant sale, which incidentally was a great success this year, as well as the HG's plants for the summer succession planting. The wildly fluctuating temperatures has meant sometimes having to put heat back on with the threat of overnight close to freezing conditions and then putting the shades up to protect from the soaring full sun. Those wonderful Victorian glasshouses with their heating boilers, great ventilation and watering systems and huge organically heated beds certainly had a lot going for them. They needed an army of gardeners to operate them of course but there are some fully automated versions nowadays, though I doubt the HG will be tempted so long as there is an undergardener on hand; though going away for a day or so at this vulnerable time of the year is something of a trauma if it is likely to be too hot or too cold. So coming up is the summer and so much to look forward to. Lazy days in the sun? Not much chance but lots of enjoyable days as we move through the gardening year. On the horizon are the lovely gardens open near the church on Sunday 1st July (see advertisement) which was such a success three years ago. Not to be missed.



Mono Skiing

Mountain Boarding

Mountain boarding, also known as All Terrain Boarding, was developed as a way of snowboarders training during their off season. It was invented by a man called James Stanley in the 1900s who went to Switzerland but couldn't ski as there wasn't any snow.

A mountain board consist of different parts (deck, trucks, wheels, hubs and bindings) for those of you who cannot picture this, it is effectively a big skate board with big wheels that can go off road. Most riders wear a crash helmet

and usually knee and wrist protectors, as depending on how steep the hill is you can travel quite fast. It's important to learn how to stop, by bending right down and sweeping round sideways (or you can just fall off).



Summer Raspberry Layer Cake & Panettone with Mascarpone and Strawberries



A summer birthday or lunch party deserves a summery cake using fresh fruit like this recipe. It's layered with raspberries and a creamy filling incorporating mascarpone and an almond liqueur.

I've also included a very simple fruit dessert to follow a summer barbeque - again using mascarpone cheese to compliment the fruit. Enjoy \times

RASPBERRY LAYER CAKE

INGREDIENTS For the cake

- 200g (8oz) butter, softened
- 200g (8oz) caster sugar
- 4 large eggs, lightly beaten
- 200g (8oz) self raising flour, sifted
- 1tsp baking powder
- Icing sugar to dust

For the syrup:

- 75g (3oz) caster sugar
- 50ml (2fl oz) almond liqueur

For the filling:

- 284ml pot double cream
- 250g tub mascarpone cheese
- 3tblsp caster sugar
- 150 g (8oz) punnet rasperries

METHOD

1.Preheat the oven to 190°C/375°F/gas mark 5.

Grease and base-line 2 \times 20cm (8in) cake tins.

- 2.Beat all of the cake ingredients together until pale and fluffy. Divide between the 2 tins, smooth the top and bake for 25-30mins until golden and springs back when touched. Cool on wire tray.
- 3. For the syrup, heat the sugar, 2tblsp water and the liqueur until sugar dissolves. Cool slightly.

- 4.Cut each cake across in half so you now have 4 cake circles. Brush each with the syrup.
- 5. For the filling, whip cream until it forms soft peaks. Beat mascarpone and sugar in a bowl and fold into the cream.
- 6. Layer the 4 circles of cake with filling and raspberries. Finish with a layer of sponge. Wrap in cling film and chill overnight. Dust with icing sugar to serve.

PANETTONE with MASCARPONE & STRAWBERRIES

INGREDIENTS

- 200g (8oz) punnet of Strawberries
- 25g (1oz) caster sugar
- 6tblsp Marsala dessert wine
- $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp ground cinnamon
- 4 slices panettone
- 4tblsp mascarpone cheese (or clotted cream)

METHOD

- 1. Hull, slice strawberries in a bowl and add sugar, wine and cinnamon. Toss.
- 2. Refrigerate for 30mins (at least) to marinate.
- 3. When ready to serve place slices of panettone on rack over hot barbeque coals for about 1 minute on each side until lightly toasted.
- 4. Place panettone on serving dish. Top with a spoonful of mascarpone and the marinated strawberries.

The van has already appeared twice and was busy with patients throughout its week's residency in May. The arrangement was developed with the centre manager, Martyn Lincoln, who confirmed how successful it has already been for his customers and staff. "I was truly impressed by the quality of care and consideration given without cost or obligation. I took the opportunity to have a hearing health check for myself and am now beginning to take my own hearing more seriously."

Matthew, along with his colleagues at Aston Hearing, is committed to early intervention and investigation as being vital to preventing permanent hearing loss. "A visit to our Hearing Van at this uniquely accessible

location could be so important to someone who is suffering any kind of ear problem or hearing difficulty."

Matthew's life is further linked to the hearing world as his partner Sarah works for Hearing Dogs for Deaf People in Saunderton. They happened to meet at a charity dog walking event – although neither had a dog!!

He is based locally and very excited for the opportunity to spread the message of "Taking Hearing Seriously" across the community and beyond.

Ellesborough Parish Council Notes - May 2017

At the last Parish Council meeting there were a few changes to the Council. Rob Alexander, after a long stint as chairman, and because of an increasing work commitment has stood down from being the Chairman and has been replaced by Debra Panikkar. Debra has lived in the village for over 21 years and in her 3 years on the Council has made a big impact with the introduction of the Adult Fitness Equipment. Rob will continue on the council and will take over as the Deputy Chairman. Other responsibilities continue as before with Councillor McGrail - Planning Comment Co-ordinator, Councillor Panikkar - Recreational Facilities (Playground, playing field and allotments), Councillor White - Transport and Road Safety, Councillor Glover - Village Hall Management Committee, Councillor Hares - Footpaths, Rights of Way and Dog Control Orders and lastly, Councillor White - Web Site and Parish Communication.

Whilst there is a general improvement in the standards of the roads within the parish, there are still continuing areas of concern. The drains on the Missenden Road are continually blocking up and the Clerk and Councillor Hares are to meet with the Local Area Technician on 5 June to discuss the problem. However, speeding is still the main concern and action is being taken to try and get a greater understanding of our concerns by the police and Bucks CC. Unfortunately, budget cuts by both these organisations mean that they no longer have the resources to action our concerns. One possibility is the introduction of Average Speed Cameras and the Council will continue to see if they could be introduced into the village.

Maintaining the appearance of the village is important and is a delicate balancing act of expenditure against results. We are lucky to have a good relationship with the contractor who undertakes the work for us and after a tendering process have just renewed his contract for a further 5 years

The latest on the Affordable Housing scheme is that on the 23rd March Cllr Matthew McGrail, Mark Longworth, the architect for Hastoe and John Lefever the project officer from Hasote met with Jenny Ion, planning officer for Wycombe DC. The discussions included the PC's preferred site and since that meeting Jenny Ion has requesting additional information from Hastoe. However we are still awaiting the outcome of her deliberations, which is understandable as Rural exception schemes are not that common in Wycombe. If Wycombe DC respond positively, then the next step will be to have further meeting with Hastoe to discuss land ownership and the scheme in general so that Hastoe may appoint an architect to take the design forward.

An important addition to the village facilities was the provision of the defibrillator which at the moment is positioned outside the parish hall. This was never intended to be its permanent position and arrangements have now been made for it to be housed in an old style red telephone box which will be positioned where the redundant telephone kiosk is now outside the Russell Arms. The "new" red box which will have been completely refurbished will have "Defibrillator" signs and a light and should be an interesting addition to the appearance of the crossroads.

Lastly, just a reminder about the Village Party which is scheduled for the 14th of July at the Parish Hall. The Silver Band will be providing musical entertainment and Buckmoorend Farm will be providing food in the way of a barbeque and there will be a bar. Please come and join us.
